1.0 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Summary of the EUCN strategic plan and activities

The strategic vision of the NZ **EU Centre Network** combines the three elements of research, teaching and outreach under a unique thematic umbrella focused on the impact, role and understanding of the EU within NZ and the Pacific region in general. The **EUC Network** is dedicated to the EU's interaction with our region in the widest terms as outlined in the 1999 Joint Declaration – involving economics, politics, security, innovation, development, democratic values and people and cultures. The guiding objectives are:

- Build a **Network** of academic excellence
- Develop EU Studies curriculum throughout NZ
- Enhance awareness of EU policies as they affect the region
- Promote innovation and intensity in bilateral relations
- Enhance EU visibility by implementing national, focused, regular and high-level outreach activities
- Provide a national vehicle for promoting a better understanding of the EU
- Develop a national **Network** of EU expertise that can be accessed by the media, government and public
- Expand people-to-people links and exchanges for academics, students and practitioners
- Undertake research relevant to the priorities of EU-NZ bilateral relations

The Workplan associated with this strategic vision is multi-faceted is to be carried out in a variety of locations reflecting the membership of the proposed **Network**. Each **Network** partners have specific responsibilities and contributions. The distinctive features of the Workplan are:

- High level public Europa lectures
- Visiting European-in-residence practitioners programme
- **Network** graduate scholarships
- **Network** Internships programme
- National and international conferences
- National weekend EU Graduate School
- Visiting EU Teaching Fellowships
- Support for **Network** Researchers
- FRENZ National Contact Point
- Pilot funding for EU research projects
- NZ-EU Survey and media analysis
- Production and dissemination of publications and media liaison

The initial six-month preparatory phase formally commenced on 1 March 2006. Planning took place before this in order to launch the EUCN activities immediately; however, no RELEX funds were utilised prior to this date.

The previous experience of the NCRE administering a 2002-4 RELEX grant meant that processes and structures were established and as far as possible these earlier mechanisms and procedures have been applied to the EUCN. Consequently, there has been a high-level of activities during the preparatory phase and the transition to the Year 1 Workplan is considered to be not qualitatively dissimilar to the launch phase. Eleven of the 14 Workplan activities identified in the original grant have taken place in the preparatory phase compared with 13 activities scheduled for Year 1 (see Workplan tables below).

2.0 DETAILED WORKPLAN for the Period 1 March 2006 – 31 August 2007

2.1 Activities

The following Table 2.1 describes the **EUC Network** activities scheduled to take place during the initial six-month preparatory phase: the locations of these activities are divided among the **EUC Network** partners. Items in **BOLD** indicate the activity has already taken place during the preparatory phase.

3.0 ADDITIONAL COMMENTARY Preparatory Phase Workplan

3.1 Teaching

Two EUCN teaching initiatives have been introduced during the preparatory phase.

- a) A new EU Studies Bachelor of Arts major comprising of 11 EU Studies courses has been introduced at Canterbury in 2006.
- b) A new Summer School course, “Doing Business in the EU” was introduced at Canterbury in 2006.

The first teaching fellowship was used to employ Dr. Koloamatangi to deliver a new 1st semester course on EU-Pacific relations.

3.2 Research

The Workplan has sponsored of four new research projects and 17 graduate theses in the preparatory phase. The research projects were chosen through an open competition process in May 2006. Appendix I provides the selection criteria used and the titles of the supported pilot projects.

Two rounds of scholarship selection have been held: a major round for those thesis graduates who enrolled as of March 2006 (12 awards) and a supplementary round in June (up to 5

awards). The decisions on the successful supplementary round applications will be made in July 2006. Appendix III lists the current scholarship thesis titles.

In June 2006 a nation-wide public opinion survey was undertaken (complementing the previous surveys undertaken in 2002 and 2004) contributing to the creation of a longitudinal database of NZ attitudes towards the EU. The survey was contracted to a third party – a professional survey organisation – for implementation. The data will be available to all EUCN partners for analysis and publication throughout the life of the 42-month Workplan. A further survey will be taken in 2008.

In May 2006, the formalisation of a “Europe Institute” at Auckland began.

3.3 Outreach

Two major outreach activities were completed during the preparatory phase: the Europa Lecture given by Commissioner Fischer Boel; and the hosting of Graham Avery as the visiting “European-in-Residence”. The Europa Lecture was held in the Grand Hall of Legislative Chambers of the NZ Parliament, Wellington. A high-profile audience of 100 invited guests attended the lecture and the following reception.

Graham Avery spent six weeks as the EUCN visiting fellow during which time he visited five of the seven EUCN partner institutions. He briefed MFAT and the Ministry of Agriculture officials, engaged with the Commission Delegation and gave a series of public lectures on current EU issues. His media profile was particularly strong and included: articles appearing in 4 national daily newspapers, a full-page article in *The National Business Review*, two extensive radio interviews and an interview on the morning TV programme “Business Report”.

Another significant related development is the establishment of a FRENZ National Contact Point (Carole Glynn) to facilitate the engagement of NZ research organisations and their researchers with the EU's 6th and 7th Research Framework Programmes and Erasmus Mundus and Marie Curie opportunities. The position was established as of 1 May 2006 and is to be funded for 36 months on a 50-50 basis between the EUCN and MoRST (to the value of €200,000).

The EUCN has issued regular media releases on EU events and issues and launched a webpage and email distribution system. Public seminars were hosted in three EUCN locations (Canterbury, Auckland, Wellington). In order to promote the transition from the former NCRE RELEX activities and the new EUCN activities, an *Annual Review* was published at the end of June outlining the new Workplan and budget.

Lastly, Anita Wreford (a PhD candidate in International Trade from Lincoln University) completed a 12 week internship at the European Parliament. Anita's placement with an MEP from the Australia-NZ group was organised and determined by the NZ Embassy in Brussels.

4.0 WORKPLAN ADMINISTRATION

4.1 Overview

The institutional structure of the **Network** involves a representative from each New Zealand partner on the **EUC Network** Board chaired on a rotating Troika principle. A Commission Delegation representative also sits on the Board. Regular meetings (twice a year in person and twice a year via the BRCSS video-conferencing facility) of the Board have been scheduled. A Management structure has been established involving the Project Director, Project Manager, the **Network** Board Chair and two members of the **EUC Network** Board.

The FRENZ (Facilitating Research cooperation between Europe and New Zealand) National Contact Point position is located in Rotorua but operates under the direction of the **EUC Network** according to an agreed set of national objectives and guidelines.

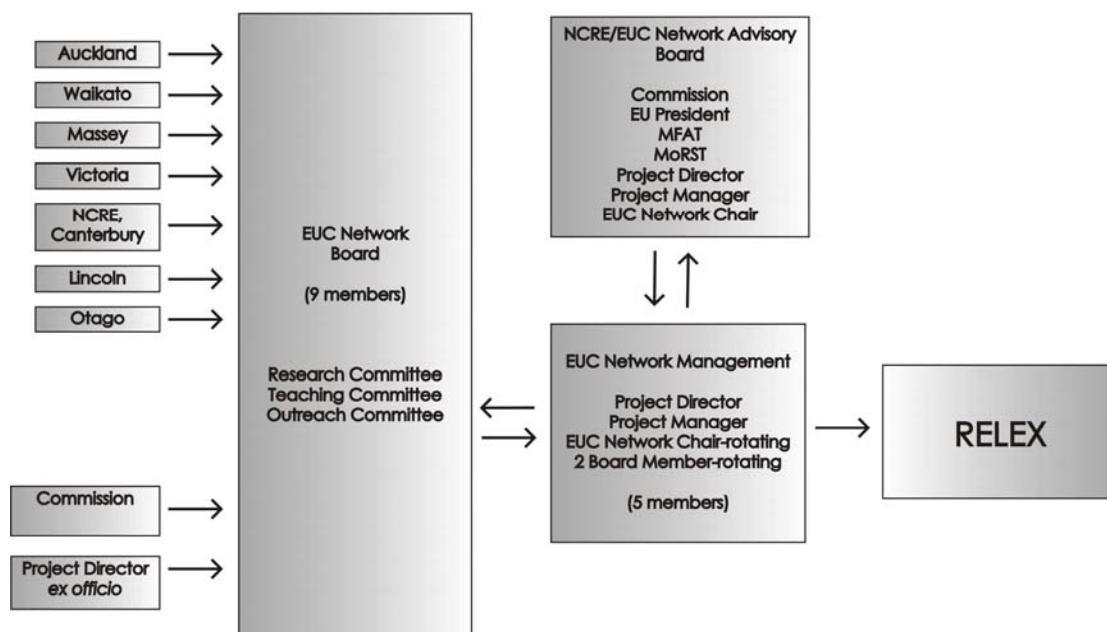
The **EUC Network** Workplan activities are divided between those that are “designated” to specific partners and those listed in this proposal as “contestable” (such as research project funding, the internships and scholarships, fellowships, etc) which are open to all partners and allocated on a competitive basis while respecting differential levels of expertise and the need to encourage development across the **Network**. In keeping with this approach, the **EUC Network** has adopted a rotation principle between all NZ Network partners across the range of designated **EUC Network** activities.

Academic partners are required to facilitate the effective implementation of **EUC Network** activities as outlined in the Workplan. Namely:

- Designated space/office to provide **EUC Network** visibility
- Designated individual/ group contact point for **EUC Network** activities
- Provide the necessary local resources for dissemination and organisation of **EUC Network** Workplan activities
- Select a representative for the **EUC Network Board**

The variable levels of expertise, capacity and institutional support across the **Network** informs the most effective strategy for maximising the impact of the Workplan. Clearly, the NCRE has the most developed EUC and is not in need of seed-funding in order to establish visibility. For the other **Network** participants visibility is low or even absent; consequently a “**Network** visibility” budget-line has been identified to provide local administrative support for consolidating or launching EU activities in each participating **Network** member. The approach allows for a *low level of long-term funding* over the full grant period. In general, all participating institutions are eligible for similar levels of support over the March 2006 – August 2007 period.

5.0 EVALUATION AND OUTPUT INDICATORS for Monitoring Performance of the EUCN

5.1 Evaluation Indicators

The information collated in Appendix IX is taken from the original grant application and summarises the 2005 level of EU activity in each partner institution (providing a baseline) as well as provides output targets for increased activity over the life of the grant. This information will inform the project evaluation to be undertaken on an annual basis. Each of the research, teaching and outreach Workplan activities as well as the listed “deliverables” employ measurable indicators.

5.1.1 *Coherence and relevance of the proposed strategic plan.*

The proposal presents an ambitious range of activities and the experience of the NCRE enhances the **Network**'s capacity to achieve a significant and sustainable impact. The proposed activities combine past and new activities:

Those undertaken previously will have the added value of being expanded in scope, executed on a truly national basis, involve a wider range of expertise and reach a wider audience. The development of new activities – such as the EU Week-end School, “Gateway EU” seminars, database of EU expertise, the online forum and initiation of new research areas – underline the dynamic nature of the **Network** and coherence in scope.

5.1.2 *Proven multidisciplinary approach*

The **Network** partners offer expertise in Politics, International Relations, Law, History, Social Policy, Cultural and Identity, Economics, International Business as well as Integration studies.

5.1.3 *The degree of inclusiveness of the project design and implementation*

The **Network** is open to all NZ universities and combines those where EU Studies already exist with others where the focus is modest. The strength of the **Network** approach is that knowledge and expertise can be transferred from established EU Studies partners to those who need development assistance. The EU Centre branding will increase the **Network**'s legitimacy and authoritative voice in terms of outreach. The **Network** has already sought links with prospective Australian and Korean EU Centres, as well as identified links through various international EUSA organisations, Jean Monnet programmes, and with domestic academic and research institutions such as the Royal Society and MoRST. The NCRE and the partner institutions have a significant number of international exchange links with a variety of Member State universities and EU Studies centres that involve ongoing collaboration.

5.1.4 *The capacity to reach and involve target groups beyond academic circles*

The **Network** performs this outreach function through a variety of activities. Institutionally, this is through the involvement of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, MoRST and the Council presidency in defining the Workplan through the **Network** Board; the creation of a database of EU expertise will facilitate greater media interaction, as will the regular **Network** press releases; the public opinion surveys and the research on the presentation of the EU in the press and TV will reach a general public target group as well as specialised sectoral interests; the European-in-residence initiative will link practitioners, policy-makers and the business community at a high level; and the target audience for the Europa Lecture are decision-makers across all sectors.

5.1.5 *The degree of commitment of the host University*

The 2000-2005 record of University of Canterbury support for the NCRE is unparalleled in NZ: not only has the university committed \$500,000 in direct support, it has established a core group of 4-6 staff who exclusively work on EU Studies and

research. The NCRE as the **Network**'s administrative core, can house and provide full office and IT support 25 researchers. Since 2005, the NCRE has become a permanent feature of the University's academic structure and profile

5.1.6 *The cost effectiveness in the implementation of activities*

The 2004 independent evaluation of EU Centres concluded that the NCRE was the most cost-effective of all 22 surveyed in North America, Australia and NZ, and that our reporting was deemed "best practice" and was subsequently adopted as a model for other EUCs elsewhere. The **Network** will benefit from the experience of the NCRE in its delivery, monitoring and reporting of activities under previous grants to the Commission. The management structure is clear and the reporting templates are transparent and match the Commission's reporting requirement format. The employment of just one project manager is the most cost-effective structure possible.

5.1.7 *The capacity to mobilise external funding and self-sustainability prospects*

The NCRE has a demonstrated capacity to attract additional external funds; this expertise will be transferred to the wider **Network** and support future funding initiatives. The broader sustainability of the **Network** will depend upon the introduction of new courses on the EU, the extension of research activities that can attract external support and the general perception of the added-value of the **Network**, as well as the continued support of each institution.

VIII. FRENZ – Objectives and Workplan

Mission

The FRENZ platform will *facilitate the engagement of NZ research* organisations and their researchers with the European Union's 6th and 7th Framework Programmes for Research and Development and other related EU opportunities. The FRENZ services will *increase the quality, quantity, profile and impact of NZ-EU research co-operation under FP7*, in particular by developing and executing a suite of activities to increase the awareness (in NZ and Europe) of opportunities for NZ engagement in EU programmes and facilitate the realisation of these opportunities by NZ.

Aims

The aim of FRENZ is to deliver an effective service to provide the *necessary information, guidance and support* to the New Zealand research community required to promote the effective participation in European Commission research programmes, in particular the Framework Programme.

Thus the FRENZ platform aims to:

- deliver relevant information on research cooperation opportunities through themed emails and web pages aimed at different research disciplines
- provide high quality advice, guidance and training on all aspects of applying for and managing European Commission research projects
- develop resources specifically designed to address NZ participation in European Commission research programmes
- assist organisations in the development of strategies to increase their involvement in the Framework Programme.

Services

To meet these aims, FRENZ services will include:

1. a "Helpdesk" staffed by an expert European Advisor, developing and using a network of European contacts with the potential to assist in enhancing NZ engagement with the Framework Programme
2. a series of weekly research discipline themed emails, addressing opportunities and key policy developments
3. a web site of resources linked to NZ participation in the Framework Programme and FRENZ activities
4. briefing visits tailored to the needs of institutions – European strategy development, seminars, training courses, proposal writing and project management assistance
5. a series of training courses and information events tailored to specific calls or topics
6. participation at relevant research conferences to promote both opportunities for EU-NZ partnering, and the FRENZ service.

FRENZ "Helpdesk"

The FRENZ "Helpdesk" will be accessible to researchers 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, by email or by telephone. Responses will be made within one working day. The helpdesk will be

physically 'manned' on three half days each week (e.g., Monday, Wednesday, Friday), except when undertaking briefing visits, meetings or vacation. During these exceptions, an answering service will be available, and every attempt will be made to maintain the normal one working day response time.

Weekly research discipline themed emails

Information from various European sources addressing funding opportunities and key research policy developments will be filtered, edited and adapted to meet the needs of NZ researchers. This information will then be split into relevant research disciplines, and emailed to registered researchers. In order to minimise the length of the email – and avoid 'scaring' researchers, it is proposed that the emails should comprise a title, summary and links to further information, with the full text document available from the FRENZ web site. (see example)

FRENZ web site and resources

The FRENZ web site will provide:

- an archive of the full text of email bulletins
- resources specific to NZ researchers
- presentations from FRENZ events
- documentation and links required for participation in the Framework Programme

The site should not duplicate efforts of existing resources.

Institutional briefing visits

Each university and Crown Research Institute should receive at least one day visit each year, although institutions in the same locality may choose to share days to increase the frequency of visits. Topics that may be addressed during these visits may include:

- European strategy development
- Seminars on recent or upcoming calls, proposal writing or project management
- Training courses on proposal writing or contract management issues
- One to one 'surgery' sessions with researchers to match skills and opportunities and identify a personal strategy for engagement with Europe
-

Training courses and information events

A series of events tailored to specific calls or topics will be arranged to address specific issues where:

- the numbers interested in a topic on an institutional basis are small, and a national event will serve to target all relevant researchers at once, or
- it useful to strengthen national networks of contacts to provide a NZ response to a call, or
- when the time constraints of a call are such that it would not be possible to visit each relevant institution in a timely manner.

Promotion of FRENZ

The FRENZ Co-ordinator will participate at various relevant NZ research conferences to promote both opportunities for EU-NZ partnering under relevant areas of the Framework Programme, and the FRENZ service. In doing this, the database of contacts will be strengthened, and demand for the FRENZ service should both grow and become more sophisticated – moving from the initial 'What is the Framework Programme?' questions to 'How should our organisation get involved in this project?'
